School History & Lasallian Tradition

La Salle College Preparatory was founded in 1956 at the request of the Archbishop of Los Angeles, who wanted a Catholic boys high school to serve the northern and eastern sections of the San Gabriel Valley. Today, La Salle College Preparatory continues to function as a private Catholic, co-educational high school. It is a Lasallian School - an educational institution that draws its philosophy and inspiration from the life of Saint John Baptist de La Salle (1651-1719), founder of the Brothers of the Christian Schools and the patron saint of all teachers. The Christian Brothers have a reputation for excellence in education which extends back to 1680, and we are a part of a worldwide educational movement with schools throughout the world.

Of particular importance is La Salle's call to carry out the mission established by its founder, Saint La Salle, "to give a human and Christian education to the young, especially the poor, according to the ministry which the Church has entrusted to the Christian Brothers." Together we strive to understand and live by the five Lasallian Core Principles: Faith in the Presence of God, Concern for the Poor and Social Justice, Quality Education, Inclusive Community, and Respect for All Persons.

Today, some 4,000 Christian Brothers and almost 90,000 lay colleagues worldwide minister to nearly one million students in 1,000 educational institutions in 80 countries on six continents. These schools serve nearly every ethnic group and religion around the world. In addition to providing strong academics, each Lasallian School also creates a community of persons deeply conscious of their responsibilities to each other, which is central to their success.

Student Enrollment & Demographics

At La Salle College Preparatory, there are 671 students from the ninth through twelfth grades. To maintain our Catholic identity, approximately two-thirds of our entering freshmen acceptances are of the Roman Catholic faith. In addition, 30% of our students are from low socioeconomic families and receive full or partial tuition assistance through the San Miguel and Brother Celestine Scholarship Funds. Average student/teacher ratio is 14:1 and the average class size is 24.

Curriculum

La Salle's curriculum pursues a rigorous balance between college preparatory courses, religious education, and enrichment opportunities. It is also committed to a values-based preparation for college that flows from a commitment to religious principles. Service-learning is built into the curriculum during each of the four years. By the end of the senior year, students will have completed in excess of 75 hours of Christian service as part of their coursework. Graduation requirements meet or exceed the University of California minimum subject requirements for freshmen admission, with more than 100 courses currently UC certified or approved.

Graduation Requirements


280 units are required for graduation. Among those, 200 units are of required courses. Students are required to take 7 courses per year.

Advanced Placement & Honors Courses

The La Salle curriculum includes 23 Advanced Placement courses, in addition to honors courses in English, math, science, social studies and Spanish. Enrollment in AP and honors courses is restricted to those who qualify through academic achievement, placement tests, and teacher recommendations. Enrollment in AP science and AP Art & Design courses is restricted to those students who have already taken a oneyear prerequisite couse. In the spring of 2025, 349 students took 814 AP exams, with 86% of students obtaining a score of 3 or better on at least one of their exams.

Grade Point Average & Ranking Policy

There are 165 students in the Class of 2026. The GPAs for the Class of 2026 are cumulative from grades 9 through 11 on a weighted 4.0 scale, and include all academic courses and advanced courses. La Salle does not rank its students.
